

Fact Sheet

Welcome to Arapahoe County, Colorado — the state's first county and one of the largest with a population of more than 630,000. Arapahoe County was named for the Arapaho Native Americans, who along with the Cheyenne, occupied most of eastern Colorado when it was only a territory.

In 1855, Arapahoe County was much larger — stretching east to the Colorado/Kansas border. When Congress established the Colorado Territory headed by William Gilpin on Feb. 28, 1861, the original Arapahoe County was broken into several counties, with the City of Denver as our county seat.

In 1902, Denver split off to become a separate county and the City of Littleton became the new county seat, where it remains today.

Today, Arapahoe County spans 850 square miles and is a land of contrast. The western part of the County is mostly urban with residential, retail, office and industrial areas, while the eastern portion is relatively rural. Littleton, along with Aurora, Bennett, Bow Mar, Centennial, Cherry Hills Village, Columbine Valley, Deer Trail, Englewood, Glendale, Greenwood Village and Sheridan make up the 13 incorporated communities of Arapahoe County.

There are nine school districts within the County and more than 350 local improvement and service districts. School districts include Aurora, Bennett, Byers, Deer Trail, Cherry Creek, Englewood, Littleton, Sheridan and Strasburg.

Arapahoe County offers a variety of attractive residential choices and a moderate cost of living. Residents enjoy excellent parks, greenbelts and trail systems, superior public services and an inviting quality of life.

Arapahoe County is governed by the Board of County Commissioners. The Commissioners, along with the Assessor, Clerk and Recorder, Coroner, District Attorney, Sheriff and Treasurer, are elected by voters to administer County services.

The County has nearly 2,034.45 employees and a \$361.7 million budget. Arapahoe County has one of the lowest mill levies of local governments in the Front Range, which is the assessed property tax rate used to cover expenses. Arapahoe County voters also authorized a .25 percent sales tax to pay for open space, parks and trails until Dec. 31, 2023.

BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

The Board of County Commissioners oversees the County by serving as the administrative and policy-making body. The Board approves the budget, hires staff, oversees land-use planning and development in unincorporated Arapahoe County; and administers county services, such as road and bridge maintenance, transportation improvements, snow and ice removal, human services and animal control.

The Commissioners are elected by voters to represent five districts, each divided by population. (District map on reverse.)

All non-elected department directors report directly to the Board of County Commissioners. Departments overseen by the Board of Commissioners include: Communication Services, Community Resources, County Attorney, Facilities and Fleet Management, Finance, Human Resources, Human Services, Information Technology, Open Spaces, Strategy and Performance, and Public Works and Development.

ASSESSOR

The Assessor discovers, lists, classifies and values all real and personal property in Arapahoe County. The Assessor also is responsible for maintaining ownership and parcel maps; submitting the Abstract of Assessment to the Colorado Division of Property Taxation, certifying values to taxing entities and producing the warrant roll. Corbin Sakkol is the Assessor.



David C. Walcher

SHERIFF

The Sheriff is elected to serve as the chief law enforcement officer of the County. He is responsible for maintaining the peace and enforcing state criminal laws. He serves as the County Emergency Manager. The Sheriff also operates the County jail and is the fire warden for prairie and forest fires in the County. David C. Walcher is the Sheriff.



Matt Crane

CLERK AND RECORDER

The Clerk and Recorder serves as the Clerk to the Board and is responsible for recording deeds, registering vehicles, issuing marriage and civil union licenses, registering voters, administering elections and maintaining records for the Board. Matt Crane is the Clerk and Recorder.



Sue Sandstrom

TREASURER

The County Treasurer is responsible for collecting, holding and disbursing County funds. The Treasurer collects property taxes and distributes the revenue to the County and other local governments, including school districts, according to their mill levy. Sue Sandstrom is the Treasurer.



Dr. Kelly Lear-Kaul

CORONER

The County Coroner is elected by voters to investigate deaths and issue death certificates. The Coroner is a physician, trained and board-certified in Forensic Pathology, the branch of medicine concerned with the investigation of sudden and unexpected, violent or suspicious deaths. Dr. Kelly Lear-Kaul is the Coroner.




George Brauchler
